And she has a dependent offspring and so, once the female dies, then she's also going to lose her calf, so it's very worrying,"

It's too early to know why it's happening, but the prime suspect? Antarctica is warming up. "There's, um, a problem with their food supply, and ... fewer seals! And that's what we've been seeing so far this year." "Less ice, fewer seals -- is that a leap?" "It's certainly a hypothesis" Holly and John have had to cobble this project together. She works for a marine animal welfare organization called SR3, and he works for NOAA Fisheries department. They get transportation in Antarctica with Lindblad-National Geographic expeditions. "This is the seventh year in a row that we've conducted research on board this ship" And it's the long-term commitment that's important. "We're studying animals that live as long as we do, and to understand them and to get enough opportunities with them, it takes multiple years" Right now, though, even the short-term commitment is in doubt.
